Futuro House lands at Central Saint Martins: what could be better than a house in the sky? Futuro House will be a place for public talks, seminars and discourse, essentially a



House for *The Intelligent Optimist* from 19 September 2015 through 2016.

Last year's highly-acclaimed LDF exhibition *Restless Futures* explored the issues in society with which designers are engaging. Our new exhibition **The Intelligent Optimist** presents the types of designer needed to achieve positive change within those issues: Future Gazers, Material Explorers, Social Agents, and The Fixers. Over 50 designers feature from a global mix of key recent Central Saint Martins graduates, and their work is explored through designs, talks, workshops, demos and performances.

The work of the young designers emerging from Central Saint Martins is almost by default optimistic – why design the world as a worse place? – and is always shot through with a canny intelligence. This intelligence takes multiple forms: the rigour of traditional inquiry; the emotional intelligence of empathy; tacit intelligences built through experience; the special kind of touch-based or haptic intelligence where hand meets mind, and so on. In all cases the intelligence is deployed in a productive manner to transform the status quo or to imagine new and better futures.

The Intelligent Optimist has never been needed more than in the current era of political and social despondency. We are all looking for alternative visions, but not naively hopeful ones. In their various combinations of wit, rigour, lateral thinking, sensuousness, ingenuity, social engagement and all-round intelligence, these Central Saint Martins graduates show new and brilliant ways forward.

Future Gazers

These are the designers who project into future worlds, jumping out from the here and now into as yet unfound possibilities. The future speculator starts with a 'What If?' and then follows the trails the question sets up. The best speculation might start in a rather strange place, but end at a point where the project appears almost self-evident, even rational.

Designers include Jaime Tai who worked with Imperial College in the lab to explore how the sugar Trehalose may be developed into products that enable humans to live on less water by reducing water loss through skin surface. Paulina Lenoir Guajardo's Excessively Long Shoes suppose a new reality in which people take command of the speed of their lives and deliberately slow down to find their natural rhythm. Asaadi & Auclair's The Exquisite Corps is inspired by Stanley Kubrick, botanical sea-mutants and René Laloux's Fantastic Planet. Hortense Duthilleux aims to restore a sense of calm and balance by completely massaging the mind with light in HighLight.



Material Explorers

These designers focus on the sophisticated exploration of material, often inventing new applications, or even new materials. Material Explorers are at the forefront of the reinvention of craft, taking a term that used to have backward-looking connotations into completely new areas.

Designers include Ana Quinones who has developed an innovative material called Materia Madura, made from waste from plantain and coffee, staple foods in Puerto Rico; Marta Bordes whose Elastic Lights is a collection of articulated lamps that bring movement and play into ceramics, questioning the role of traditional ceramic objects; Natha Khunprasert, whose innovative laser-cutting method in Chasing Colour makes us look at acrylic jewellery in a whole new light; Matty Bovan constructs garments with a wide range of materials including broaches and jewellery, and questions the relationship of function/decoration.

Social Agents

The designs of Social Agents are rooted in social and political contexts, and aim to transform the status quo for the better. They expand design beyond the object, and into the processes of our designed world.

Designers include Carlotta Novella and her Industrious Neighbourhoods project which looks at retrofitting existing housing to create new spaces for home-working; Yuxi Sun creates jewellery in response to friendships formed with strangers couch surfing at her flat; Evangeline Pesigan, who explores a collaborative making process that connects design to artisan craft cultures such as those in the Philippines to generate new furniture; Emil Kozole, who has created a self-censoring typeface.



The Fixers

Fixers see physical and social stuff as contexts to directly engage with, not so much as 'problems' - seeing the world as a set of problems is rather miserable and so counter-intuitive to the intelligent optimist - but as situations we can make productive sense of. Fixers are deeply practical and very lateral thinking, looking at things from a fresh perspective.

Designers include Pan Wang and her Memetery, a digital burial plot which uses augmented reality; Georgia Fleck, whose Carpet Everything explores the way discarded materials can be transformed; Abay Zhumagulov, whose Ova is a night-time bedside diffuser to prevent or treat auto-immune diseases; Caroline Angiulo looks at how we can use materials to trigger a state of mind wandering which research shows promotes mental well-being and creativity.

The Intelligent Optimist runs from Saturday 19 September to Saturday 17 October incl.

- The London Design Festival has established a reputation as one of the largest and most dynamic design events in the world. Now celebrating its thirteenth year, the Festival will run from 19-27 September and aims to celebrate and promote London as the design capital of the world, and as the gateway to the international creative community.
- The official guide to the London Design Festival 2014 will be distributed across London in early September. Over 300 events and installations will be on offer across the capital, with over 250 Partners participating in the nine day Festival.
- The London Design Festival is a key constituent of London's Autumn creative season. Established in 2003 its role is to celebrate and promote London as the world's design capital and gateway to the to the International design community. In 2014 the Festival attracted a dedicated or direct audience of over 350,000 people, from over 60 countries.
